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Endangered Species Day

What a fabulous day everyone had last Wednesday, both at school and on the Field Trip. If you haven't already seen the great story in the Blayney Chronicle, visit


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The Primary students' first stop was at the BOSSIAEA FRAGRANS SITE at Abercrombie Caves Reserve. They learnt all about this amazing plant that is critically endangered. The 430 plants we have in the Abercrombie area are the only ones of these species IN THE ENTIRE WORLD! They are protected by wire cages and are monitored by cameras on site for predators. The Bossiaea Fragrans is a highly unusual plant that doesn't have leaves at all. The branches are leaf-like in that they perform the process of photosynthesis. The plant is a native pea with beautiful yellow flowers.






The second stop on the Field Trip was at the Abercrombie River where the students attended four different environmental sessions, down on the riverbank. They learnt about the declining population of our native Macquarie Perch species and the possible causes of this.



They were shown how to identify the introduced fish species in the river and those that are doing the most damage - the Common Carp and the Red Fin. The students were also told about the benefits of snags in the river and how a huge re-snagging project is currently underway to help support the health of the Abercrombie. The students also learnt about the problems associated with the monoculture of trees along the banks of the Abercrombie and helped address this problem by planting 100 native trees and shrubs to, eventually take the place of the She Oaks currently dominating the landscape.





The last session of the day was held at Abercrombie Caves. Stuart Bremner spoke about the importance of maintaining sites such as the caves for their natural beauty and to help protect native species of flora and fauna. Dave Coote then told the students about another highly endangered species specific to the Abercrombie area; the Booroolong Frog.



This species of frog is endangered due to the sediment that is washing into the river from the unprotected banks. The sediment washes into the crevices under logs and between rocks, where the frogs lay their eggs and is a contributing factor to the drastic decline in their numbers. In addition to this, the introduced species of fish, such as Common Carp and Red Fin eat the frog's eggs.

Back at school, the Infants students were treated to the same sessions as the Primary students, but with the special treat of Mary Bonet attending and taking the students out to our glider's nesting boxes to look for any evidence that the nesting boxes are being utilised. What a surprise everyone got, when the last box was checked, close to the School Car Park. As the extension arm of the camera was placed into the hole of the nesting box, a gorgeous Sugar Glider emerged, crept onto the tree trunk and proceeded to glide across the scrub in full view of all the adoring students and staff!







Many thanks are extended to Casey Proctor, Senior Lands Officer at the Central Tablelands Local Land Services for accessing the funding and specialist guest speakers to ensure the day was a huge success.

This wonderful day was designed to give the local students ownership of several endangered species and sites in the area and has certainly achieved its objective.

Special mention also to the wonderful members of our Trunkey Public School P&C Association: Karen Brown, Kerry Garvey and James Gilbert, along with the help of Julie Fardon, ensured that the students ate a delicious morning tea and lunch and were well hydrated throughout the day.


